FREEZING PROCEDURE

- Am I a good candidate for freezing eggs/embryos?
- What tests are done before egg retrieval?
- What are the steps for an egg retrieval cycle?
- How many eggs or embryos should I freeze to reach my family planning goals?
- How many cycles are typically needed to collect this number of eggs?
- How many office visits can I expect?
- How many injections will be needed for a treatment cycle?
- Will I need to inject medications at home?
- What are the risks and side effects of medications?
- What are the risks and side effects of egg retrieval?
- Am I able to work during a cycle?
- Am I able to have sex during a cycle?
- Do you recommend any lifestyle changes to improve my chance of success?
- For how long can frozen eggs or embryos be stored?

THE CLINIC

- How many egg or embryo freezing procedures does your clinic do each year?
- What is the freezing process at your clinic?
- Are frozen eggs and embryos stored at your clinic?
- If stored in another facility, how are they transported?
- How are the eggs and embryos protected in storage and during transport?
- How do you ensure that my eggs or embryos aren't mixed with others?
- When needed, how are eggs or embryos thawed for use?
- Does your clinic offer in-vitro fertilization when I'm ready to use my eggs?
- What is your clinic's IVF success rate using frozen eggs or embryos?
- During what hours does your clinic schedule appointments?
- Who should I call if I have questions outside of office hours?
- How will I be notified about treatment progress or test results?
- Will your clinic help me understand how and when to take medications?
